

Learning Project WEEK 1 - My Family	
Age Range: Y3	
Weekly Maths Tasks (Aim to do 1 per day)	Weekly Reading Tasks (Aim to do 1 per day)
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Working on <a href="#">Times Table Rockstars</a> - your child will have an individual login to access this <b>(20 mins on SOUND CHECK). Battles will be set regularly so get ready for 3LK v 3FP!!!</b></li> <li>Play on <a href="#">Hit the Button</a> - focus on number bonds, halves, doubles and times tables.</li> <li>Adding totals of the weekly shopping list or some work around money. This <a href="#">game</a> could support work on adding money.</li> <li>Practise telling the time. This could be done through this <a href="#">game</a> (scroll down to access the game). Read to the quarter hour and the nearest 5 minutes.</li> <li>Get a piece of paper and ask your child to show everything they know about <b>Addition</b>. This could be pictures, diagrams, explanations, methods etc. They can be as creative as they want to be. To remind yourself of the method and for some EXTRA practise, watch this <a href="#">video</a>.</li> <li>Practise counting forwards and backwards from any given number in <b>1s – challenge yourself an attempt in 2s 5s and 10s.</b></li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>You could share a story together. This could be a chapter book where you read and discuss a chapter a day.</li> <li>Listen to your child read and let them discuss what they have read. Encourage them to read with expression and intonation.</li> <li>Watch <a href="#">Newsround</a> and discuss what is happening in the wider world. <b>Discuss it with your family using your sentence stems; I agree with... I disagree with... I would like to build on that point...</b></li> <li>Get your child to read a book on <a href="#">Oxford Owl</a>, discuss what your child enjoyed about the book.</li> <li>Get your child to read a book on <a href="#">Active learn</a> and complete the activities. These focus on comprehension skills.</li> <li>Explore new vocabulary you find when reading. What are the origins of this word? Can it be modified? Can you find any synonyms or antonyms for your new word?</li> <li>With your child, look in magazines, newspapers and books for new vocabulary they are unfamiliar with.</li> <li>Listen to some online audio books. Click <a href="#">here</a> to listen to some brilliant David Walliams' books.</li> </ul>

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Practise the Year 3/4 for <a href="#">Common Exception</a> words.</li> <li>Practise your spelling on <a href="#">Spelling Shed</a></li> <li>Practise your spelling on <a href="#">Spelling Frame</a></li> <li>Choose 5 Common Exception words. Write synonyms, antonyms, the meaning and an example of how to use the word in a sentence. Can the word be modified?</li> <li>Log on to <a href="#">Spelling League</a> and earn points as you practise your spellings. Can you beat Miss Kinkead <b>Username: first name_class</b> (eg ryan_3LK) <b>Password: 123456</b></li> <li>Choose 5 Common Exception words</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Write a recount of your day. This could be used in history one day to show what happened during this period. Watch this short video to remember the <a href="#">key features</a> of a diary entry.</li> <li>Write a character description of a member of their family. What do they look like? How do they behave? etc...</li> <li>Write a story involving members of their family. Do they have to defeat a monster? or find something they have lost? Use this <a href="#">random vocabulary generator</a>. Can you include on the words in your writing?</li> <li>Write a set of family rules, could they begin with 'We always.....' rather than 'We do not .....</li> <li>Write a letter/email/ text message to a</li> </ul>

### Learning Project - to be done throughout the week

The project this week aims to provide opportunities for your child to gain a better understanding of their own family. Learning may focus on what different makeup of families, what traditions your family has, stories linked to your family etc.

- **Let's Wonder:**

Who is in your child's immediate family? What other relatives do they have? How does their family link together? How many people do they have in their family? Why not spend time looking through old photos and talking about the people in their families. What family stories can they tell? How is life different to their parents? grandparents?



- **Let's Create:**

Create a piece of artwork entitled 'Family'. This could be a drawing, a self portrait, a sculpture or collage. Could they copy another artist's style? Which materials have they chosen to use and why? How do they feel about their piece of artwork? What would they change or not? [Family portraits](#).



- **Be Active:**

[Go Noodle](#) with the family or have a family workout. Fancy a dance? There are lots of dance videos they could try. [Dance](#). Maybe try some [Yoga](#). [Joe Wicks](#) has short classroom exercises which are great 'brain breaks' and he is also doing a morning PE lesson at 9am. Get up, get ready and get active! Mr Rose would be very impressed.



**Recommendation at least 2 hours of exercise a week.**

- **Time to Talk:**

Perhaps they could play a board game, facetime a member of their family they have not seen this week, enjoy a family indoor picnic or have a family dinner.



- **Understanding Others and Appreciating Differences:**

Discuss how their family is different to other people's families. Discuss whether all families are the same? Does it matter? Do all families have the same faith? Do all families worship in the same way? Use this video to get you started.... [Who is God?](#)



- **Reflect:**

Find out what music their family members enjoy. Do they like the same music? What is their favourite song? They could listen to different pieces of music together with their family. Do they like/dislike any particular types of music and why? Can they identify the instruments they can hear and describe how the music makes them feel? Why not get them to listen to some of the [classics](#)?
