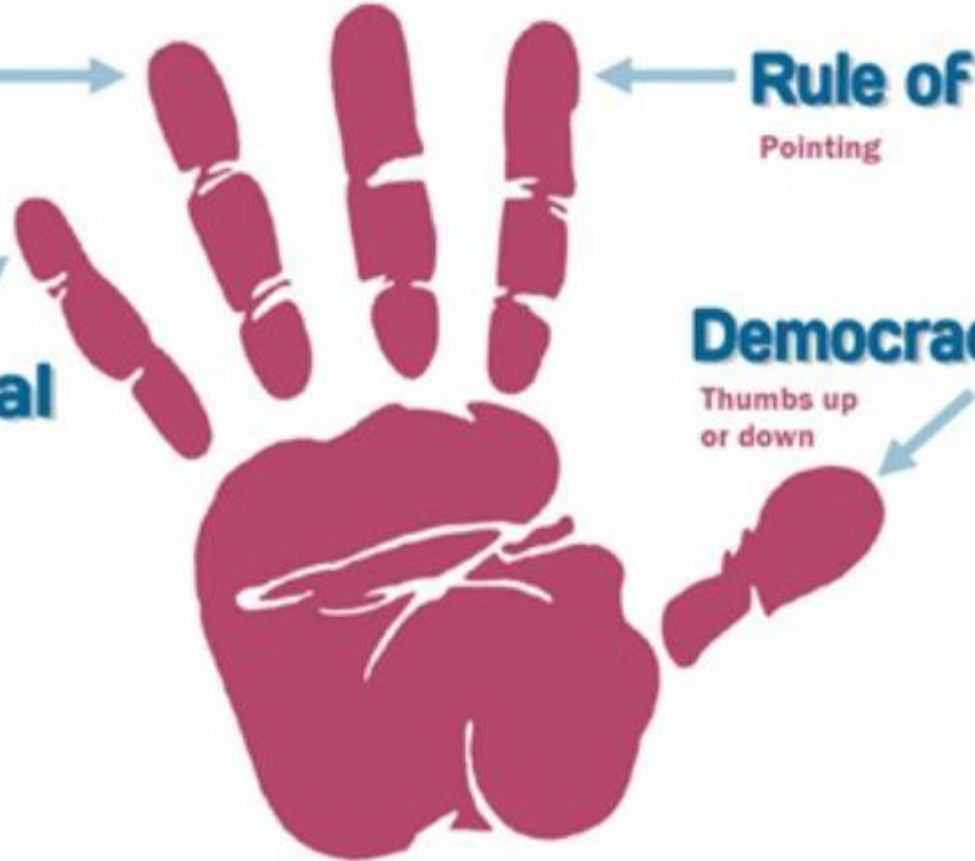

There are five British Values learned in schools

- *Democracy*
- *Rule of Law*
- *Tolerance*
- *Respect*
- *Individual Liberty*

Democracy

This is about making decisions together and making sure that everyone has a voice and the right to express their opinions.

Britain is a democracy – this means that the people in Britain vote for the people who make the laws and decide how the country is run. If we didn't have a democracy, just one person might be able to make all the laws and that would not be fair.





We have democratically elected our own school Prime Minister, Deputy Prime Minister and Environment Minister based on their manifestos. This will happen every year. School councillors and Eco councillors are also elected every year and they feed back your ideas to the school council, so that we can make Windmill a better place. All children have a voice through the councils just like British citizens do through their local member of Parliament.

So what does democracy look like at Windmill?



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The Rule of Law



The scales of justice are about fairness in court cases. There are two sides to every story, and each side of a case or a story must be heard. Each side gets the chance to present “evidence”, or the details about the case. Lady Justice carefully “weighs” the claims of each side, using the scales of justice.

Rules and laws are guidelines for how people should behave. They are based on ideas about what is right and wrong. Instructions are also called rules. For instance, there are rules of grammar (how a language works) and rules of a game (how a game is played).



In Britain we have a police force who make sure people do not do the wrong thing and break the law - this means that we are safe.

At Windmill, we have a Code of Conduct

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Respect

Mutual respect is a reciprocal form of respect between two or more people, where everyone shows respect to the other. Each person acknowledges the value, opinions, and boundaries of the other.

Respect is also one of our values at Windmill!



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Individual Liberty

- Individual liberty means each of us having the freedom to make our own choices and do what we want – within reason.
- As long as we respect the other British values and the rights of others, then we are free to pursue our ambitions, and follow our own will.



What does that mean?

- For example, we can make choices for ourselves, knowing that we are in a safe and supportive environment.
- We can make choices because at Windmill we have a safe environment, where it is safe to make mistakes.
